Hello Parents and Guardians,

Welcome to Term 4! It's hard to believe we're already here. This term is packed with excitement as we celebrate 2024 and start planning for 2025. There's a lot to look forward to, including special events like Year 6 Graduation and Crazy Hair Day.

Regular attendance is so important, and it's great to see progress. Last term, our average attendance was 87.11%, and this term it's up to 94.31%. Keeping this up really helps set the foundation for future success in school and beyond.

Earlier this year, the Department conducted a Parent Engagement survey. We're using these insights to enhance how we connect with families, and we encourage you to stay in touch with your child's teachers about their learning and progress. In addition to formal reporting and parent-teacher meetings, feel free to reach out anytime.

Our teachers have also been working on creating 'Calmer Classrooms,' setting up spaces that are effective for learning. This will continue to evolve as we go forward.

In the coming weeks, we'll be fine-tuning our 2025 Site Improvement Plan. This plan will set clear goals for improvement, with a strong focus on wellbeing, positive behaviours for learning, and key areas like English and Mathematics. On our upcoming pupil free day, November 25th, staff across the school, preschool, and OSHC will be participating in *Zones of Regulation* training. This is a school-wide approach to help children recognise and manage their emotions, providing a consistent framework to support their success. As we implement this program into 2025, we'll be involving parents and carers as well, so everyone can use the same language and strategies.

At the end of the term, you'll receive your child's end of year report. This is a great opportunity to sit down together and reflect on their achievements and set goals for what's next.

Lastly, we've updated our Sun Protection Policy, which will take effect in 2025. This policy has been updated on the website. In the meantime, please make sure your child comes to school with a hat to stay sun safe.
